
I would like to thank all our parents for their continuous support to our children and the school in achieving our goal. Your support to the school is invaluable and greatly appreciated by the management and staff.


The portals of our school are open to all who share our dreams. We heartily welcome any suggestion to make our dream a reality. So lets all work together for the success of our students.

started bearing fruits as the students are now responding enthusiastically to the invitation of contributions for the News Letter. In a big heap of papers that lay on the editor's table, there were many wellwritten, original articles and well composed poems which are being published in this issue.

Parents frequently complain that their child is weak in English writing and conversation, that he or she cannot write correct sentences, that sentences are not happily worded, that the child is not fluent in English speaking and the like. I think the best way to deal with all such problems is to develop a taste for reading and writing, to inculcate habits of sitting in the library, going to the book-stalls, reading English newspapers and magazines. Let us not confine their reading and writing to the subjects that are taught at the school and the text-books that are prescribed in the school-curriculum. Let them go beyond it. Let them not cram the sentences without understanding their meaning, as most of our students do for getting good marks in the examinations. A student at the secondary level must be proficient enough to understand the text and to frame correct sentences. If it is not so, the child will definitely have problems in future when he takes to higher studies. Its indeed a pitiful thing that the child knows the answer of the question but cannot write it correctly because he has a poor hold over the language.

The basis of learning is reading. Children who are exposed to an extensive range of interesting books and encouraged to read and share them, are consistently found to learn the target language more quickly. Teachers can play an important role in helping the child to go beyond the text-book framework and learn on their own out of choice and interest. Children who read well do better in all subjects and in all aspects of schooling - and beyond.
